Abby Loebenberg



- ◆ Submit your Study Abroad application by <u>March 28</u>. There is a \$75 application fee. No deposit is required, but if you withdraw after March 28th, you will be charged the unrecoverable portion of the total program cost.
- ◆ Places are awarded on a first come, first serve basis!

Obtain departmental credit

You get three automatic Honors credits by participating, but need to apply for credit toward other requirements.

Make travel arrangements

You will be responsible for ensuring your arrival in Oxford no later than Sunday, June 24th @ 4pm.

Program Costs

The estimated cost of \$3,000 includes tuition, room and partial board (one dinner every day and one gala dinner), but not the cost of transportation.
